EXPLORING THE WORD OF GOD Men's Bible Study

Our Bible Study explores the Sunday Readings. Each week we read the upcoming passages from the Lectionary, then receive a commentary explaining the Scriptures tying them together with the other parts of Scripture. As the adage states, Scripture must be read in context or it is merely a pretext. Scripture is Divine Revelation, God revealing Himself to us through the Written Word and also the Incarnate Word. Through Divine Revelation, the Catechism explains,

God, who dwells in unapproachable light, wants to communicate his own divine life to the men he freely created, in order to adopt them as his sons in his only-begotten Son. By revealing himself God wishes to make them capable of responding to him, and knowing him, and loving him far beyond their own natural capacity" (CCC, #52)

The whole of Divine Revelation, all of Scripture and Tradition, reveals God's desire to touch us with his Son and Spirit and in so doing, we become "sharers in the divine nature" (CCC 51). To share God's life becomes our quest. Scripture Studies seek, ask, and knock at the door of Scripture, using our Tradition to understand and explain literal and hidden meanings contained within the text so we partake in God's



The Father will send in my name, he will teach you all things, and bring to your remembrance all that I have said to you (John 14:26).

The Father sends the Spirit to the Apostles, endowing Peter and his successors with keys to bind and lose not according to our human understanding, but God's. Our Scripture Studies seek to listen to what the Spirit says to us through the Word. We read the text, then explore the meaning asking questions, looking for answers. As scholars teach, the Scriptures themselves often give the answers to our questions. So does the Catechism of the Church as well as many of the great commentaries written.

divine life (2 Pet 1:4).

St. Peter, a man steeped in Scripture, outlines the framework to read, study, and pray the Scriptures. In his letter, he tells us.

No prophecy of Scripture is a matter of one's own interpretation, because no prophecy ever came by the impulse of man, but men moved by the Holy Spirit spoke from God (2 Pet 1:20).

In other words, Scripture is prophecy, God's self-revelation. Scripture needs a Divine Authority to understand and protect the written Word from merely private interpretations. This authority interprets through the Holy Spirit, Whom

Return to Mysticism

The greatest loss of modern civilization, mysticism, comes at the greatest price. Mysticism, that encounter with the divine transcendence in which we enter the mysteries of the supernatural, has been lost and replaced by philosophy. Philosophy rationalizes and relativizes divine truths to personal interpretation. It is based upon the notion of Nominalism.

Nominalism, founded by William of Ockham, a Franciscan Friar of the 14th Century, held the view that universals and abstract objects do not actually exist other than being names and labels. Simply put, the name given to an object determines what it is. It removes the objectivity of the object, subjectivizing it. This subjectivism includes God. Ultimately, God is a name, a subjective concept, not a reality.

This philosophy, handed down throughout the centuries, blossomed in the Enlightenment. During the Enlightenment Era, most intellectuals, especially the philosophers saw reality as material, natural, and logical. The Enlightenment Era removed the mystical and reduced religion to devotionalism: it is not the source of objective truth. Truths can be explained by reason, science, and logic alone. Scripture and religion became grounds for political morality. The state determined what is best for the people they govern using religion and scripture as a resource—not the source.

Mysticism became sentimentality, a personal pietism, based upon feelings, emotions, and personal convictions; not objective truths revealed by Divine Revelation. Scripture became a historical book, with interesting stories that inspire. They keep it as a resource because people have a desire for the divine in their heart. This divine desire, however, is personal, subjective, and idealistic, neither objective nor rational.

Philosophy and Theology split. Philosophy became the source of truth and wisdom. Theology, which includes mysticism, the highest form of theology, became personal piety and devotional. Is this true?

Mysticism believes differently. Truth comes from God, revealed to us through the Scriptures. His Divinity is not doubted, but reality, for we experience a longing for love, truth, justice, goodness, and beauty. These five are known as transcendentals, or "the horizon of perfect knowledge" (Karl Rahner, Bernard Lonergan). These transcendentals,



attributes of God Himself, create in our soul a desire for divine love. Our desire for the transcendent seeks fulfillment, and only God who is perfectly just, good, true, and beautiful satisfies these mystical desires.

St. Augustine understood this as he underwent his conversion famously stating, "You have made us for yourself, O Lord and our heart is restless until it rests in you" (St. Augustine). Blaze Pasquel thinks this too, summarized here, "Within every person, a God-shaped abyss, an emptiness exists that only God can fill." Pope Benedict XVI knew this asking the question "What can really satisfy man's desire?" He answers:

Through love, a man and a woman experience in a new way, thanks to each other, the greatness and beauty of life and of what is real. If what is experienced is not a mere illusion, if I truly want the good of the other as a means for my own good, then I must be willing not to be self-centered, to place myself at the other's service, even to the point of self-denial (Pope Benedict General Audience, Wednesday, 7 November 2012).

The void in our heart desires perfect love and only these transcendentals fill it, nothing else: not philosophy, science, politics, nor idealism. Yet, science tries to replace Revealed Truth with natural truths. Philosophy wants to define Divine Goodness and Justice with rational and logical explanations. So too with Beauty, idealism wants to reduce Divine Beauty to artistic expression.

Our longings, though abstract and sometimes irrational, are real and true. Each of us seeks love and wants to be loved. To behold beauty and become beautiful, to know the truth and live in the truth, to be good and be treated justly. Mostly, Divine Love completes our heart's holy desire to be lifted above the limited materialistic, rationalistic, scientific, and technocratic beliefs. We desire more. We long for mysticism.

Another transcendental ought to be added, however, forgiveness. People hunger for forgiveness. They long to heal their guilt. They feel, deep within their conscience, shame for their sins. Seeking forgiveness acknowledges our need for God. Forgiveness admits we are not God but need God to heal us of our disordered desires. No other person exemplifies our longing for forgiveness than Judas.

He sold his soul, coin by coin, stealing from the coffers of Christ. Everyone knew he was a thief, yet he could not admit his guilt. Covered in shame, he hid behind his injustice, rationalizing he was just. He was doing a good deed, especially when he sold Jesus, his friend.

To sell a person, whether we cheat, slander, or abuse, if we neglect, isolate, or manipulate, our hearts seek forgiveness. Even more so, how many long to forgive the one who hurt them. The Prayer, the Our Father, reveals this transcendental: Forgive me of my trespasses as I forgive those who trespassed against me. This is a Divine Truth, that philosophy, science, and politics cannot explore. They cannot explore the depths of the heart, especially our need for forgiveness. Even psychology which outlines its need, cannot touch the depth of a wounded heart. Jeremiah knew this stating, "The heart is deceitful above all things, and desperately corrupt; who can understand it?" (Jer 17:9).

Judas experienced the deceit of his heart, when he realized Jesus was to be condemned, not condoned. Desperate to heal his guilt, he returns to the priests and asks for a refund, as though selling a person is the same as purchasing a product. The priests reject him and deny him of repentance. He committed the irrational sin; he sought forgiveness from sinful man-not from his merciful Father. True repentance comes from God and returns us back to God restoring our longing for his friendship. Yet, one French mystic warns us about false repentance:

Those who see themselves fallen, inflict disorder on themselves, become troubled, worry, and distrust the mercy of God because of their own self-love. They pity the harm they have done to themselves rather than the offense they have committed against God" (Madam Guyon, commentary on Matthew's Gospel).

Mysticism, that longing in our heart to experience the presence of God's love affirming us even when we have sinned, breaks our self-love. False repentance, the sinner pities the harm he did to himself, not the injury he did to God or the other. He, however, who falls, filled with true sorrow, repents knowing he not only hurt himself, but acknowledges the pain and suffering caused to all involved. In this light, repentance accepts, "It is no longer I who live, but Christ who lives in me" (Gal 2:20).

True repentance, freedom from guilt, comes at a price. We sacrifice self-love, reject self-pity, and trust not in myself, but in my Father.

Longing for forgiveness is the essence of mysticism. God's goodness gifts us his love through his justice to restore the truth of who we are, God's child, only to resurrect our beauty. Freed from false repentance, forgiveness supplants the rationalism we used to justify our guilt. It breaks the idealism that beauty comes without forgiveness. It redirects our self-love to embrace God's love. The brokenness of our hearts experiences God's love restoring us. We see how beautifully, truthfully, and wonderfully made we are. Filled with the Divine Presence, we return to our mystical origins.

We are excited to see it grow and watch the positive impact we can have in the community.

Let's break it down and talk about the FOOD that Christ has given to us.



I am learning so much more about my faith and me through the many activities that Christ the King Parish tirelessly offers. Fr. Doug Grandon joined us here at Christ the King for a three-day Advent Eucharistic Revival Mission. He gave three talks between December 19th and 21st to enkindle the flame of Eucharistic faith and devotion and guide our hearts to individual conversion. Ordained later in life in 2008, Fr. Grandon currently serves as the National Chaplain for FOCUS and is one of the National Eucharistic Revival Preachers.

His first talk, My Eucharistic Journey into the Catholic Church, delved into Fr. Grandon's own conversion experience: he became a Catholic priest after spending years as a married Protestant pastor. "On June 26, 2003, I entered into full communion with the Catholic Church. I had concluded that only a priest ordained by a successor to the Apostles could offer me the Body and Blood of Christ. My thirty-year journey into the Church significantly started and ended with I Corinthians 11:23-32, St. Paul's somewhat frightening instruction on the Eucharist," said Fr. Grandon.

The second talk, From the Garden to the New Earth: The Eucharist in the Context of Salvation History, discussed where the Eucharist stands in the whole of salvation history. Fr. Grandon explained, "While God was spiritually present in the Jewish temple, he is now materially present at every Catholic Mass and in every Catholic tabernacle. What we lost in the Garden, we fully regain in the New Earth, when the Kingdom comes in its fullness. We must cling tenaciously to Jesus' promise, 'I will never leave you nor forsake you!' (Hebrews 13:5)." His final talk, *Come, Holy Spirit! Give Us a Eucharistic Revival!* highlighted the importance of these years of National Eucharistic Revival. "Our bishops have called us to pray to the Holy Spirit for a Eucharistic Revival, because of a dramatic decline in Eucharistic understanding and reverence among contemporary Catholics. What are the bishops' hopes for a Eucharistic Revival? What can we learn from Catholics in other eras of Church history? What fruit should we expect from a Eucharistic Revival?" Fr. Grandon answered these questions and more in

regards to the practicality of Eucharistic Revival at a parish and personal level.

If you missed the talks with Fr. Grandon, be on the lookout for future Eucharistic Revival events! We all know people who have fallen away, or who have never known the Real Presence of our Lord in the Eucharist. Eucharistic Revival events are an amazing way to introduce-or reintroduce-our neighbors to the love of God.

BLESSED CARLO ACUTIS: INSPIRING TEENAGER KNEW EUCHARIST IS THE 'HIGHWAY TO HEAVEN'

The Italian teenager Blessed Carlo Acutis has captivated Catholics young and old in recent years, especially since his 2020 beatification. Although only 15 when he died of leukemia, Carlo was tabernacle. [...] resolved to prioritize his life around the Eucharist. Each day found him attending Mass and spending time in prayer before the Eucharistic Lord. He believed, as he put it, "the Eucharist is my highway to heaven." And he endeavored to share this reality with others, with a focus on Eucharistic miracles, through his

virtual and online apostleship. After receiving his first Holy Communion at age 7, Carlo made it a point to spend time in contemplation before the

Although he might have been somewhat unusual in his youthful zeal for the faith, Carlo was also very much interested in things of his peers, such as his love for video games and films. He was by all accounts a "computer geek" who studied college textbooks on the subject as early as age 9. But Carlo

recognized that his talents and interests in the field must be used for good. He set limits to his use of media for personal enjoyment. Carlo's mother has said, "Carlo was the light answer to the dark side of the web. My son's life can show how the Internet can be used for good to spread good things."

This meant Carlo was resolved to make use of his tech savviness for the good of others. From age 9, he was reading college texts on computer coding. He developed websites for his high school and nearby parishes. He also created a website that cataloged all the major Eucharistic miracles ever recorded.

Carlo's generous spirit also could be seen in how he offered up his last suffering from leukemia for others, telling doctors that he knew others were suffering more than he. He said, "I offer to the Lord the sufferings that I will have to undergo for the Pope and for the Church." Although he wanted to make a pilgrimage to the sites of the Eucharistic miracles he helped others come to learn about, his declining health made it an impossibility. [...]

Just before his death at 15, Carlo said, "I'm happy to die, because I've lived my life without wasting even a minute of it doing things that wouldn't have pleased God." Although he died at a young age, Carlo's personal holiness and discipleship left a lasting legacy. And his renown continues to grow. "To always be close to Jesus, that's my life plan," he was known to say. Now, through his witness, he inspires old and young alike to do the same.


